




Who's Who in the Cast

Behind the Scenes

Playwright **John Glore** used to read *The Stinky Cheese Man* book to his little girl, Josie. She's thirteen now, but they still love the book. He has written other plays for young audiences, including *Wind of a Thousand Tales* and *Rhubarb Jam* (which went out on tour to Orange County elementary schools way back in 1997). Both of those plays have been produced at many theatres all over the country. He has also written some plays for grown-ups. Two,



On the Jump and *The Company of Heaven*, were produced at South Coast Repertory. Once he worked with three crazy guys who call themselves Culture Clash on a new version of a very old Greek comedy called *The Birds*, which was also produced at SCR. When he's not writing plays, he works here as the Associate Artistic Director, which means he helps the top bananas run the theatre and helps other playwrights make their plays as good as they can be.



Jon Scieszka also wrote *The True Story of the Three Little Pigs, The Frog Prince Continued* and the Time Warp Trio series. He cannot tell a lie and says that he and Lane celebrate the Stinky Cheese Man's birthday on the second Monday of every February.

Honest **Lane Smith** wrote and illustrated *Glasses*, *Who Needs 'Em?, The Big Pets* and *Flying Jake*. He illustrated the Time Warp Trio series, *The True Story of the Three Little Pigs* and *Halloween ABC*. He has won the Golden Apple of Bratislava, the Silver Buckeye, the Silver Medal from the Society of Illustrators, and a bunch of other gold and silver stuff. If he hadn't been an illustrator, he probably would have grown up in a log cabin and become president.



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Director **Anne Justine D'Zmura** knew she wanted to work in the performing arts when she danced in her first ballet recital as a bumblebee at the age of three. Originally from Pennsylvania, she studied directing at



Hampshire College and continued at Yale School of Drama where she received her MFA degree. Since that time she has buzzed around directing at places including the Guthrie Theater, The Juilliard School, Shakespeare Santa Cruz and The Acting Company and is currently teaching and directing at CSULB. She dedicates this play to the stinky cheese man in all of us and to the stinky cheese sitting in her fridge right now. Set and Costume Designer **Nephelie** Andonyadis's love of theatre started when she spent her childhood summers in a one-car garage that her neighbor had converted into a theatre for the community. There she participated in every way she possibly could, both onstage and off. Since then, she has studied architecture and stage design and loves to imagine and invent the visual world in which plays happen. Her recent work for young audiences includes the costume design for the world premiere of *Lily Plants A Garden* for Center Theatre Group's P.L.A.Y. and the set design for *The American Girls Revue*, now being remounted at the newest American Girl Place in Los Angeles. She lives in Redlands, where she is a professor of theatre arts and has worked as an artist in residence making masks with the children at her son's elementary school.

Lighting Designer **Christina L. Munich** is delighted to be working on the Theatre for Young Audiences series again this season, after designing *The Little Prince* and *The Emperor's New Clothes* in previous seasons. She has also designed numerous Players productions at SCR. Other recent designs include 3-7-11 for Cornerstone Theater Co., *Carmina Burana* for the Pacific Chorale at OCPAC, and *Cinderella* for Inland Pacific Ballet. In addition, she teaches lighting at the Orange County High School of the Arts. Christina received her MFA in Lighting Design from UC, Irvine.

Musical Director and Sound Designer **Tim Horrigan** has written music for movies and musicals, and has been Musical Director for *Pinocchio, The Emperor's New Clothes, The Hoboken Chicken Emergency* and *Bunnicula* here at SCR. "Working with a talented cast and crew in creating on stage a world that didn't exist before is just about the most fun you can have," says Tim. And if you live in Irvine, you just might have him as your English teacher at Northwood High School when you get older. In the meantime, Tim says, "Keep taking those piano lessons!"

Stage Manager **Erin Nelson**^{*} grew up in Virginia acting in musicals and commercials. She soon realized that backstage was the place to be and has been a professional stage manager for more than six years, working in places around the country like La Jolla, California and Boise, Idaho. She even got a Masters Degree in Stage Management from UC San Diego. She enjoys cheese, but prefers a more subtle Gruyere or Gouda.

Assistant Stage Manager **Kristin Ahlgren*** became a stage manager because she discovered doing that was much more fun than piano lessons, dance class or acting camp. She has worked for the Long Wharf Theatre, La Jolla Playhouse, Opera Pacific and Disneyland, where she got to set the Rivers of America on fire every night for two summers working on FANTASMIC. This is therefore the second production she has ever done that is all about fairy tales. 11
