

 A) This woman was queen of several important regions in Spain during the late 1500s. She is remembered as a powerful ruler who supported Christopher Columbus' expeditions to the New World.

(Hint: This was the most popular name for baby girls in the United States in 2009 and 2010.)

B) An 18th-century British naval captain and explorer who led the first ship to cross the Antarctic Circle. He was notably kind to his men, and his ships were much cleaner and healthier than was usual at the time!

(Hint: Mr. Popper's first penguin is named after this man.)

 C) This Italian explorer set sail from Spain in 1492 with three ships—the Niña, the Pinta and the Santa Maria—and hoped to sail around the world to Asia. Instead, he was one of the first Europeans to land in the Americas.

(Hint: There's a national holiday named for him, which is celebrated on the second Monday of October.)

D) This man ruled parts of Spain in the late 16th and early 17th centuries. With his wife, he supported Christopher Columbus' voyages to the Americas.

(Hint: He was married to Isabella of Castile.)


 E) This woman was one of the most famous queens of the United Kingdom. A territory in Antarctica, discovered in 1841, is named for her.

(Hint: She ruled from 1837 to 1901, making her the second-longest-reigning monarch in the history of the United Kingdom.)

F) This Portugese explorer led the first expedition to circumnavigate (sail all the way around) the world in the 1520s—although only one of his five ships made it all the way around the globe.

(Hint: He's got the same first name as the king in another clue.)



I guess you could say I was bit by the acting bug, because I've loved it ever since! My family moved a lot when I was a kid, so I also love to travel. I've lived in seven different states, including California

where I attended the Academy for the Performing Arts, a performing arts high school here in Orange County. After high school, I went on to get my bachelor of fine arts degree from the University of Texas, Arlington, and have continued to travel and act ever since! Artist Bios

PLAYWRIGHT ROBERT KAUZLARIC. I live in Chicago with my wife, two cats, lots of books and a banjo. I fell in love with theatre in sixth grade, when I played a tiny little part in my elementary school's production of *Tom Sawyer*, and have acted ever since. I started writing plays when I was in college and have been lucky enough to get to make plays based on some pretty awesome books, like *The True Story of the 3 Little Pigs!* and *Naked Mole Rat Gets Dressed, Treasure Island* and *The Three Musketeers. Mr. Popper's Penguins* was one of my favorite books when I was a kid. It also was one of my dad's favorite books when he was a kid, so he loved to read it to me. My dad loved penguins almost as much as Mr. Popper does and I wrote this play in memory of him.

COMPOSER AND LYRICIST GEORGE HOWE. Some people are born into a family, but I wasn't. I was adopted when I was four weeks old and the couple that took me home—who loved and cared for me—are my mom and dad. That's kind of what happens in *Mr. Popper's Penguins*, isn't it? Both my parents loved the arts, so I grew up listening to a lot of music and going to plays. I lived about an hour outside of New York City and my earliest memories are of sitting in theatres and watching musicals. I loved the songs the best and my parents bought me recordings of Broadway musicals so I could learn them and sing them any time I wanted. I never thought that one day I'd be writing songs for musicals when I grew up. I think I'm a lucky guy because I can share my songs with people all across the country!

DIRECTOR AND CHOREOGRAPHER ART MANKE grew up in Chicago, where he produced and directed his first play at the age of 11 in his best friend's garage. He continued to act, sing, dance and direct his way through high school, and was a theatre major in college; later, he studied acting in graduate school at the American Conservatory Theatre in San Francisco. After moving to Los Angeles, he co-founded a classical theatre company called A Noise Within. Since then, he has directed many plays at SCR, including *Peter and the Starcatcher*. For television, he has directed several shows including "Hannah Montana."

MUSICAL DIRECTOR ALBY POTTS loves music. He began playing his first instrument in elementary school and knew right away he wanted to be a professional musician. He got his first paying musical job in the eighth grade and has been working ever since. Alby's first piano teacher taught lessons in her house, which her husband had built by hand around a gigantic tree. He made it out of found lumber, stones and junk and kept the tree trunk and lower branches in the living room. He had two grand pianos and the roof leaked when it rained, but nobody seemed to mind. Alby wrote a piano concerto at the age of 13 and his great junior high music teacher, "RO," let Alby perform it with the school orchestra. Teachers who encourage their students are the best! It makes a difference for the rest of your life, just like discipline and practicing. Enjoy the show!

SET DESIGNER KEITH MITCHELL returns to SCR, where he designed Anastasia Krupnick, Junie B. Jones and A Little Monkey Business, Junie B. Jones in Jingle Bells Batman Smells! and Ben and the Magic Paintbrush. Yeah, mostly shows with really long titles! He has designed sets for plays at many of the theatres in Los Angeles and around Southern California. He enjoys painting and recently illustrated a book, written by his friend JoAnn Dickinson, called I Love to Go Camping. Keith is an artistic associate of Rogue Artists Ensemble, a theatre group that makes shows with puppets, and he also is an Emmy Award-winning commercial art director. He spends his free time in a cabin that he shares with a bat, a tribe of chipmunks and a cadre of lizards. He is a University of Southern California Trojan alumnus, a member of the United Scenic Artists, Local 829 and the Art Directors Guild, Local 800.

She has designed costumes and/or sets at SCR for 14 Theatre for Young Audiences shows and more than 35 other productions including Abundance, The Whipping Man, Peter and the Starcatcher, Rest, The Whale, The Trip to Bountiful, Circle Mirror Transformation and Ordinary Days among others. She also designed sets and costumes for more than 60 productions for Denver Center Theatre Company, A Noise Within, Milwaukee Repertory, The Old Globe, Pasadena Playhouse, Georgia Shakespeare and many local theatres and in her native Romania. She has worked extensively in film and television in the U.S. and Romania, having design credits with I.R.S. Media, Cannon Films, PBS, Full Moon Entertainment and Romanian Films. She graduated with an MFA in set and costume design from the Academy of Arts in Bucharest.

LIGHTING DESIGNER JOSH EPSTEIN has been working as a lighting designer for 16 years. In college at the University of Chicago, he studied political science and did theatre as a hobby. Although he always loved the performing arts, it wasn't until he moved to New York and got his MFA from NYU that his career really got started. Now he travels the country and designs lighting for shows from coast to coast. In Los Angeles, where Josh lives, he has worked at such places as the Mark Taper Forum, Pasadena Playhouse, Kirk Douglas Theater and Geffen Playhouse. In addition to designing, he also teaches lighting at UCLA. When he isn't working, Josh loves to spend every free moment with his wife and three daughters.

SOUND DESIGNER MICHAEL K. HOOKER is based here in Orange County. He actually started working with audio in elementary school because none of his teachers knew how to set up the cafeteria sound system. He now loves sound design as a career because very few people really know what it means. If he does a good job, you probably will hear every note and word in this wonderful show. He is most proud of the many shows he designed for Walt Disney Imagineering, all of which are in faraway Disneylands located in Paris, Tokyo, Shanghai and Hong Kong. He is a professor of sound design at the University of California, Irvine.

PUPPET DESIGNER AND DIRECTOR SEAN T. CAWELTI was just three years old when he convinced his parents to buy him his first puppet at a swap meet in

Orange County. Growing up, he was inspired by movies that told stories using puppets and he now is a professional puppet designer and director. He studied theatre at UC, Irvine and studied puppetry at the Tisch School of the Arts at New York University. Sean is the artistic director for Rogue Artists Ensemble in Los Angeles, a theatre company dedicated to telling new stories with puppets, masks and media. He is the Center Theatre Group's 2015 Sherwood Award recipient and has won awards for directing, designing things and for writing. STAGE MANAGER ROXANA KHAN was an evil witch in a play a long time ago. After a while, she realized she like being backstage quite a lot more. As a young girl, she took classes at SCR, and is so happy that she gets to work here as an adult. American History in Mr. Popper's Penguins The Great Depression



Mr. Popper's Penguins takes place in the 1930s, during the Great Depression, a time of poverty and hardship for many Americans. Historians link the beginning of the Depression to a stock market crash in 1929, which caused many people to lose their savings and their jobs. Like many other families, the Poppers worried about having enough money for food—even before they had to feed a bunch of penguins!

Works Progress Administration

During the Great Depression, President Franklin D. Roosevelt developed a plan to help boost America's struggling economy. He called it the New Deal. The Works Progress Administration, or WPA, was an organization created under the New Deal that was designed to put unemployed people back to work. In the play, Mrs. Popper looks for work with the WPA to help pay the bills during the winter months when Mr. Popper is unemployed.



Admiral Byrd

Mr. Popper's favorite explorer is Admiral Drake, who didn't really exist. The Admiral Drake in Mr. Popper's Penguins is based on a real-life explorer, though: an American aviator named Richard Byrd. Admiral Byrd led four expeditions to Antarctica and was the first person to fly over the North and South Poles. He became very famous for his achievements—and for the books he wrote about his adventures.



An Expedition of Your Own

In *Mr. Popper's Penguins*, Mr. Popper dreams of visiting the South Pole with his hero, the great explorer Admiral Drake. Imagine that you could travel anywhere in the world. What's your dream expedition?

Where would you go—and why?

What would you do once you arrived?

What would you bring with you on your expedition? Pick three important (or special) items.





Period Pieces

Mr. Popper's Penguins is a period piece, meaning that it is a work of art that takes place in a particular era. In this case, the play is set in the 1930s, about 80 years ago. Many things have changed since then: the way we dress, dance, eat and even talk! The actors in *Mr. Popper's Penguins* must behave like people in the 1930s in order to put on a convincing performance.


Professional actors often are called upon to appear in period pieces, which can mean playing people from hundreds or even thousands of years ago: they could be courtiers in the Middle Ages, soldiers in the 1860s or immigrants in the 1990s. To immerse themselves fully in their characters, they need to learn about the history and culture of the people they're portraying. They also have to practice the movements and speech patterns of their characters, and get used to wearing period-appropriate costumes. It's a lot of work, but when the actors get it right, the audience gets treated to a pitch-perfect glimpse of a bygone era.


Many of the American theatre's best known plays are period pieces, either because they were written long ago or because a contemporary playwright chose to set a piece in the past. Students in SCR's Theatre Conservatory have the chance to explore a wide range of time periods in their classes. Recent Players productions have transported audiences to early 19th-century England with *David Copperfield*; 1930s New York City with *Annie*; early 20th-century London with *Peter Pan* and *Mary Poppins*; and late 19th-century India with *The Jungle Book*.

Have you seen other plays that you would describe as period pieces? How would those stories have been told differently if they took place today? If you wanted to create a period piece of your own, when would it take place? How would the words and behavior of your characters reflect that time period?
