Antoine de Saint-Exupéry

AVIATOR AND AUTHOR EXTRAORDINAIRE

orn in Lyon, France, in 1900, Antoine de Saint-Exupéry was a man who looked at his life's many adventures through the eyes of a child. His interest in aviation began at the age of twenty-one when he learned how to fly a plane. Five years later, while delivering the mail to remote settlements in North Africa, he started to spend his evenings writing about his thrilling and often dangerous experiences. Once his plane

crashed and he was forced to walk for days through the barren Sahara Desert before being rescued.

When World War II b roke out, Saint-Exupéry joined the French Air Force but fled to the United States in 1940 after the Nazi occupation of France. He tried to join the American war effort as a fighter pilot but was denied because of age. To console himself, he wrote and illustrated what was to become his most famous work, "a child ren's fable for adults" about


an aviator downed in the Sahara and a boy who falls to earth from another planet.

Shortly after The Little Prince was published in New York in 1943, Saint-Exupéry retu med to North Africa and finally realized his dream of flying a warplane for his country. On the

morning of July 31, 1944, he took off on a spy mission in a Lockheed P38 Lightning and was never heard from again. Saint-Exupéry's disappearance remained a complete mystery until April 2004, when the stunning news came that the wreckage of his plane had been found by a diver at the bottom of the Mediterranean, less than two miles from the French coast.

be Little Prince is one of the most popular books in literary history. According to some sources, it ranks third behind the Bible and the Koran in number of readers. Since its publication in 1943, this slim little volume has been translated from the original French into more than 100 different languages. As a result, it has been read and loved by millions of children and adults all over the world.



he Sahara Desert is the largest desert in the world, stretching from the Atlantic Ocean in the west to the Red Sea in the east. The Sahara is so large in fact that the continental United States could fit within its massive borders! The desert covers a total 3,500,000 square miles—fully one-third the entire continent of Africa. Elevations range from below sea level to more than 11,000 feet, and as in most desert environments (including parts of Southern California), rainfall averages less than 3 inches per year. Temperatures vary from extremely hot during the day to bitterly cold at night. The highest temperature ever recorded on earth was in the Sahara—can you guess what it was?** Two million people live in the Sahara, which may sound like a lot until you realize that's only 4% of the world's population



Out on a Limb

he baobab is unlike any other kind of tree. It is found in the tropical savannas of Africa, India, Madagascar and Australia, where it grows up to 75 feet tall and can live for thousands of years. One of the largest baobab trees in South Africa has a circumference of 152 feet, which means that it would take more than two dozen adults joining outstretched arms to reach all the way around its trunk. Because the baobab is leafless for much of the year, it usually looks as if

it's been plucked out of the ground and stuffed back in upside-down. Every part of

pinkish bark for cloth,

baskets and rope; the leaves

for medicines; the

flowers for glue; the fruit (also called "monkey-bread") for

food and fuel.

From when I was a kid. I always knew I wanted to be a part of something magical. When I was 7, two life-changing events took place: my father took me to see a production of Peter Pan and he read me a book about the life of Houdini. From then on, all I dreamt about was either becoming an actor or an escape artist. I would challenge my older brothers to tie me up with rope in the most difficult of knots. Much to their pleasure, I struggled to free myself for hours without success. I decided, after that, maybe I should try acting instead. Acting has become for me, as the Fox says, "essential." because the emotions felt by an audience "are invisible to the eye." I have performed in theatres across the U.S. (including acting in SCR's Cyrano de Bergerac) and have introduced Shakespeare to many students in Northern California.

Behind the Scenes

Playwright **RICK CUMMINS** is one of the composers of the Off-B radway musical revue *That's Life!* (Outer Critics Circle nomination/Best Off-B roadway Musical of 1994,) He also wrote music for the 1995 Off-B radway revue *Pets.* To celebrate its 50th anniversary, he and John Scoullar created a musical theatre adaptation of *The Little Prince.* For the Brooklyn Academy of Music, he wrote *Tiny Tim's Christmas Caro I,* and for Theatreworks USA he wrote *Sherlock Holmes and the Red-beaded League,* soon to be made into a video. His incidental scores for *The Glass Menagerie, Wait Until Dark, Icarus's Mother, Exit the King, Death of a Salesman, A Midsummer Night's Dream* and *The Taming of the Shre w* have been performed around the world.

Playwright **JOHN SCOULLAR** has written lyrics for cabaret perf o rmers, children's songs, books and rock videos; a musical, *Canticle*, about St. Francis of Assisi; a drama, *Old Fashioned Bargain Days*; and a comedy, *Fitzy and Bucko*. With Mr. Cummins he wrote the scripts and theme song for a teen series called "Yo! TV..." As a Broadway performer, Scoullar was in the original productions of *Hot L Baltimore, Over Here, Candide, King of Hearts* and *God Bless You Mr. Rosewater*.

Director **ANNE JUSTINE D'ZMURA** knew she wanted to work in the performing arts when she danced in her first ballet recital as a bumblebee at the age of thre. Originally from Pennsylvania, she studied directing at Hampshire College and continued at Yale School of Drama where she received her MFA degree. Since that time she has buzzed around directing at places including the Guthrie Theater, The Juilliard School, Shakespeare Santa Cruz and The Acting Company. She dedicates her work on this play to the Little Prince in all of us and the miraculous Little Princes in her life.

Set Designer **DONNA MARQUET** has designed all of SCR's Theatre for Young Audiences productions. She loves to design, draw, paint and especially likes to work on shows that are as much fun as *The Little Prince*. Her background includes college in Ohio and a master's degree in California and she feels "education is the most important gift you can give yourself."

Romanian-bomCotume Designer **ANGELA BALOGH CALIN** has designed all of the Theatre for Young Audience productions. She also designed the set and costumes for SCR's recent production of *The Re-*

treat from Moscow. For several years she has designed SCR's touring productions, including this year's Birdman. (Watch for it at your school!) She is very fond of The Little Prince because it is the first book she read in French when she was in first grade, and for a long time she dreamed of traveling to far away places to meet all those wonderfully strange people and wicked animals

Lighting Designer **CHRISTINA L MUNICH** is delighted to be working on the Theatre for Young Audiences series again this season, after designing *The Emperor's New Clothes* last season. She has designed numerous Young Conservatory shows at SCR, including last year's 1212, Crow & Weasel and Beloved Dearly. Other recent designs include Grease at Perf o mance Riverside, The Music Man at Fullerton Civic Light Opera and A Midsummer Night's Dream at Chapman University. In addition, she teaches lighting at the Orange County High School of the Arts. She received her MFA in Lighting Design from UC, Irvine.

Composer and Sound Designer **PAUL JAMES PRENDERGAST**'s work has appeared in theatres, at theme parks, in feature films, on recordings and in music venues nationwide. This is his third show at SCR, and his first Theatre for Young Audiences production. Since starting out on piano at age 7, he has taught himself how to play about 20 different instruments. He also likes to build his own instruments out of old found objects (try it sometime). When he was ten years old, he told his father that he wanted to be a musician when he grew up. His father told him that he couldn't do both.

Originally from Richmond, Virginia, Stage Manager **ERIN NELSON*** is thrilled to be working at SCR again after working on *The Hoboken Chicken Emergency, The Emperor's New Clothes, Sideways Stories from Wayside School* and *The Wind in the Willows*. She has also worked for La Jolla Playhouse, The Old Globe, Idaho Shakespeare Festival and Theatre IV.

Assistant Stage Manager **CHRISSY CHURCH*** got her start in FRONT of the audience playing Cinderella's Evil Stepmother in her high school's production of *Into The Woods*. Luckily for America's audiences, she discovered her real interest was in Stage Management, and Chrissy began her life behind the scenes. She studied theatre in college and found that the best way to learn about theatre was to do theatre. This is her first Theatre for Young Audiences show, but she has had the pleasure of working WITH kids in shows like *The King & I, Ragtime* and SCR's *A Christmas Carol.*




