


PLANT YOUR OWN KINDER

In fact, I could fill a zoo with the creatures I've been, like the Elephant's Child, Charlotte the famous Spider and Miss Fielding the Mouse. I'm lucky to have been an actress since I was



three. That's because my mom and dad met in a play directed by my grandpa — then I grew up acting in plays *they* directed! I also loved playing violin, viola, trumpet and softball. I even thought I might someday be a pitcher for the Dodgers, an archaeologist, or the first female president! When I'm not playing a singing mole, you might hear me at Griffith Observatory narrating the planetarium show.

Most recently, I appeared in *Don't Talk to the Actors* at Laguna Playhouse — but I hope you'll talk to me after the show today!

A little while back I played the funny guy in *Stomp*, right across the

But now I know that I was practicing acting like an animal so I could play a toad.

I am super excited to turn amphibian for this awesome show! You may have seen me on this very stage in *The Adventures* of *Pør Quinly, The Prince and the Pauper* and *James and the Giant Peach*. Also, I have been on television as a sneaky student

on *Las Vegas*, a prankster on *Scare Tactics* on SciFi Channel and an aspiring magician on *Pushing Daisies* (with my twin brother Graham). Much love to my little brothers Jack, Michael, Jacob and Evan who keep me young at heart and also, to Amanda. And remember, when you are eating cookies, please, know when to say when.



ERIKA WHALEN (Bird/Turtle/Squirrel/Mother Frog/ Mole)

My mom loves to tell the story from my childhood when I would run around the house as Alice chasing the White Rabbit. Since I can remember, I've loved playing in a world of make believe. As an actor I have met people and visited places I could



only imagine. I visited New York City in West Side Story and 42nd Street. I've been shipwrecked in Twelfth Night, in love in A Midsummer Night's Dream, and married to Thomas Jefferson, the man who wrote our Declaration of Independence, in 1776. I was last seen at SCR as a bride on her wedding day running through the streets of New York after her husband who was trying to find An Italian Straw Hat. Though I've encountered many people in my theatrical journeys (real and imaginary) who have touched my life, my dad and mom will always be my heroes.

BEHIND THE SCENES

Author ARNOLD LOBEL was a born storyteller. When he was growing up in Schenectady, New York he would make up stories on the spot to tell his fellow second graders. However, he thought of himself more as an illustrator than a writer. During his distinguished career Mr. Lobel wrote and/or illustrated over 70 books for children. He wrote and illustrated Fables in 1981, for which he won a Caldecott Medal. And before that he had two Caldecott Honor Books — his own Frog and Toad are Friends (1971) and Hildilid's Night by Cheli Duran Ryan (1972). He also had a Newbery Honor Book: Frog and Toad Together (1973). But most of all he had millions of fans — young children who appreciated his warm, friendly, uncomplicated vision of life.

Composer and Playwright ROBERT AND WILLE REALE are brothers who sometimes write plays together. Robert is the older brother. He works as a composer and record producer. He has composed Broadway musicals as well as music for film and television. Willie is an actor and lyricist who founded the 52nd Street Project in New York City. This organization brings inner-city children together with professional artists to create theatre. In 1994 Willie Reale received a MacArthur Fellowship in recognition of his work with theatre and young people.

Director NICK DEGRUCIO is so excited to be working with Frog and Toad and their pals at SCR, all for the first time. He has directed many musicals and plays in Los Angeles and throughout Southern California. He was very lucky to receive the Los Angeles Ovation Award for Direction three times. Some shows he has directed are 1776, Jekyll & Hyde, The Laramie Project, Zanna Don't, Beebive, The Last Five Years, The Andrews Brothers, Side Show, The Full Monty, Guys and Dolls and The Fantasticks. Some plays that he directed for young audiences have included Jack and the Giant, Wizard of Oz, Sleeping Beauty, Alice in Wonderland and The Secret Garden. He also teaches at AMDA, which is a school for young artists, and runs his own theatre company in L.A. called Havok Theatre Company. He wants to thank David Emmes, Martin Benson, John Glore and everyone at SCR for inviting him to direct this show for you. Music Director/Arranger DEBORAH WICKS LA PUMA is a composer, music director and performer who loves working at SCR where last season she was music director for *Imagine* and before that she was a one-woman-band for *The Only Child*. She has been working with shows for young audiences for over 15 years all around the country, and served as music director for many world premiere musicals, including *Willy Wonka, Tom Sawyer, Alexander Who's Not Going to Move* and *Nobody's Perfect* at the Kennedy Center in Washington D.C.; *Einstein is a Dummy* at the Alliance Theatre in Atlanta, GA; and *Ferdinand the Bull* and *Looking for Roberto Clemente* at Imagination Stage, in Bethesda, MD. She has been playing piano and writing songs since she was nine. She went on to study music at Stanford University and NYU's Tisch School of the Arts. Deborah is writing a new musical for SCR called *Jane of the Jungle* with her writing partner Karen Zacarias, so come back and see it when it premieres here! Set Designer FRED KINNEY builds the models and creates the drawings that the carpenters and painters then make into the scenery that you see right now on stage. This is Fred's second production at SCR; he also designed a painted snow storm for a new play called *Sunlight*, last season. He grew up in a small town in Texas and has always loved to draw and make things. When he was a small boy, he thought he might become a painter, sculptor or an architect and then, in high school, he started to design the school productions and really enjoyed it and still does.

Lighting Designer STEVEN YOUNG has been listening to frogs and toads croak for much of his life. His mom and dad live in a place surrounded by cornfields and forests, and on hot summer evenings, all you hear is a constant chorus of croaking. That doesn't have anything to do with lighting, though. Steven likes playing with colored light and how bright or how dark a stage is, and generally making pictures on stage that look like different times of day, or different times of year. Steven gets to travel to fun places to create lighting for different people; he's been to Germany, Australia, New York City, Miami Beach and even places here in Southern California, like Ventura, Vista, Riverside, Hollywood and Santa Monica.

Costume Designer SOOJN LEE is from Korea, which is a beautiful country. Soojin has always enjoyed art since she was a little girl. She can remember spending most of her childhood just drawing and being inspired to make and design anything and everything! So, Soojin studied fine art and decided to study and travel abroad to meet new friends like Frog and Toad. Soojin went to Wimbledon School of Art in the U.K. and CalArts in the U.S. to study costume design and discover different cultures. As a costume designer, Soojin has worked on a lot of Shakespeare plays, new plays, musicals, films, dances ... Now she is here to help you imagine new friends, Frog and Toad!

Sound Designer MARK JOHNSON has been working as a sound guy for nine years. He is originally from Tucson, AZ. Mark loves theatre so much he went to college and got a degree in sound design at CalArts. This is his first design at SCR, however he has been working here for three years and has worked on many of the shows that you may have seen. He is very happy that his job is to hit pans together, bounce springs, and make so many silly noises for you to hear! Mark also gets to make sure that you folks in the audience can hear the actors and that they sound great. The actors are wearing small microphones hidden on their bodies that capture their voices so we can make them louder for you to hear, even if you're sitting in the back. Can you find the mic on your favorite actor?

Stage Manager AMY BRISTOL BROWNEWELL once played a crazy fairy godmother who turned Cinderella into a motor-biker in her fourth grade class play. She has been in the theatre ever since. When she grew up she decided getting to wear a headset was just as fun as acting! Stage Managers don't get to act crazy on stage, but they still have a great time. She sits behind you in a room called the booth. She is behind a window so she can't talk, but she can wave!




